Trustees' Report for the Year Ended 31 December 2018

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2018. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The Principal Objects of the Trust as set out in its Memorandum of Association are:

- 1. To promote urban regeneration and the redevelopment and revitalisation of the area of Woodlands and neighbouring areas ('the operating area'), for the benefit of the residents of the operating area without distinction as to their race, age, gender, religion, or political or other opinions;
- 2. To relieve unemployment for the public benefit among people resident in the operating area in such ways as may be thought fit, including assistance to find employment;
- 3. To promote and advance health among people resident in the operating area;
- 4. To advance environmental protection and improvement for the benefit of the general public, and in particular people resident in the operating area;
- 5. To advance the arts, heritage and culture of the operating area;
- 6. To advance citizenship among people resident in the operating area;
- 7. To promote religious and racial harmony and to promote equality and diversity among people resident in the operating area;
- 8. To promote and/or support other similar projects and programmes, which further charitable purposes, for the benefit of people resident in the operating area.

Trustees' Report for the Year Ended 31 December 2018

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities Overview

2018 was another busy and successful year for Woodlands Community. It was a year of consolidation with our focus on building up our existing projects rather than taking on new ventures. Our Community Building (Woodlands Workspace) became firmly established as an accessible, affordable and popular community meeting space. It has helped us extend our reach further into the community and acts as a 'shop window', increasing our visibility and profile. Our Community Garden and Community Café continued to flourish and our community clean ups helped tackle the ongoing challenge of keeping our neighbourhood clean as well as green. The year was not without some challenges, having to find new office space and one of our café staff being off long-term sick. However the hard-work of both our staff and volunteers helped us overcome these difficulties and enabled our activities and projects to continue and grow.

Woodlands Workspace

Our Community Building opened in October 2017, but by the end of 2018 has already become firmly established as a well-loved community resource. It was hired by over 120 different groups/organisations/individuals in 2018 and has seen a real increase in the range of activities that are happening. We've had mothers with toddlers, lacemakers, singing groups, dance rehearsals, yoga classes, training and talks, writing workshops and even our first Workspace wedding.

We continue to have three main strands of activity: arts, environment, health and well-being.

The principal funder for the building was Creative Scotland so we are keen to ensure that the building maintains a strong arts strand. Over the last year we had two artists in residence as well as series of artist talks, whilst our Woodlands Artist Network events enabled local arts and crafts people to come together for learning and support.

A survey we carried out showed that people have a stronger sense of connection to community as result of using building, with over 80% of hirers saying they felt more connected to the local community. Whilst with only 10% hirers having been previously involved in our work, it shows the value of the building to us in reaching out further into the community. We have also seen a growing synergy between users of building and our other projects, with in particular more Workspace users starting to get involved at the community garden.

We are pleased to have been able to have kept our hire charges at the same rate as in 2017 and feedback from both users and hirers continues to be really positive:

"Woodlands Workspace offer their facility at a very affordable rate which has allowed me to run my group weekly, for the general public, without due financial worry. I must commend the staff team who, from the first day I made inquiries, have proven their professionalism and kindness to me time after time. Being efficient and helpful they made it easy for me to book and access this space... and gave me the warmest welcome on arriving to Glasgow. Their running of this space is very valuable to the wider community. Woodlands Workspace is about community and bringing people together, serving together for the greater good of all."

"Woodlands Workspace is a brilliant asset for the community. It is economic, accessible, user friendly and in the heart of the community. It allows people to make things happen for themselves."

Unfortunately capital funding applications for the four studios we wished to add to the lower level of the site were unsuccessful. Our board agreed to hold a 'Vision Day' early in 2019 in order to revisit our options for the completion of works.

New Office

Over the summer of 2018 we were advised that our lease for our office at the Fred Paton Centre was not being renewed. We had three months to find a new office, but after looking around locally it was clear that there were no suitable offices in the vicinity. We managed to find a solution, with a portacabin office being installed at the lower level of the site, taking advantage of the foundations and utilities we had already installed. We moved into the new office in October 2018. It has proved very beneficial for our managing of the Community Building and being on hand for arranging keys and to meet hirers. We share toilet and kitchen facilities with the building so has also enabled us to get to know more who is using the building.

Our weekly **Community Café** continues to flourish. Over the last year we held 51 cafes, attended by average of 67 people per week, serving over 3400 three course vegetarian meals cooked using fresh and seasonal produce. Cafes were supported by an average of 14 volunteers per week. Our volunteers come from a mix of backgrounds and the work is having a transformational impact on people's lives, as illustrated in the quote below:

Charitable activities

"Graeme (who has autism) is a different young man from just few months ago. He is now more independent, confident, talks a lot more, likes to share what he does at the café, he's made friends and feels a sense of belonging. He's developed an interest in food and cooks from scratch when he is at home. This is something he never did before."

We also held 20 Cookery Workshops, attended by an average of 12 people per session. This included workshops delivered in partnership with HomeStart dad's group and a local Chinese community group. We held over 40 Homework Cafés, after school clubs delivered in partnership with Queens Cross Housing Association, providing after school support to families, averaging 16 people per week.

Our **Community Garden** expanded the number of raised beds in gardens, carrying out a programme of repairs and improvements. We held twice weekly drop in volunteer sessions held at the Garden (83 in total, averaging 14 people per week). 77 other gardening/biodiversity sessions were held outwith these times at range of locations, averaging 9 people per session. Plus we held 15 garden volunteer training events, attended by average of 10 people.

We expanded our work with both primary and secondary schools, with a total of 40 sessions held, attended by average of 20 students per session as well as ran more activities with local nurseries and groups working with pre-school age children.

The garden continues to be a great space for socialising and unwinding from the stresses of city life, as illustrated in the quote below:

"I find visits to the Woodland garden to be a positive and uplifting experience for me, working with the soil, meeting and passing the time of day with other raised bedders and working and growing things together, the whole thing is a very healing experience for many. The woodlands community garden is located in the heart of a strongly multicultural community and I regularly see a cross section of people there; parents and children, young people working along with older people, foreign students enjoying the social contact, working with their hands, taking time to de-stress from study pressures. I have also met some asylum seekers at the project who seem to get a lot out of the garden's friendly and welcoming atmosphere"

Community Clean Ups

There is an ongoing issue of street litter and flytipping in our neighbourhood. Our monthly community clean ups have made something of a difference to the way our streets look. We have a strong core of volunteers who take a lead on the clean ups, and average around 15 people each month coming to help out. Over 2018 we also continued to work with Glasgow City Council and local residents to improve the condition of back-lanes, lending tools and equipment for residents to make environmental improvements.

A huge thank-you goes to all our volunteers who have helped us in 2018. From members of the Board working behind the scenes to guide our organisation's strategy; to garden volunteers out in all weathers greening our neighbourhood; to café volunteers serving up weekly meals with the warmest of welcomes to all the café visitors and to our clean up volunteers continuing to tackle local hot-spots of rubbish and fly-tipping. We appreciate all that you do and look forward to working with you again in 2019.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The trustees aim to maintain free reserves in unrestricted funds at a level which equates to a minimum of three months of unrestricted charitable expenditure.

Free reserves stand at £82,770 at balance date, with three months' unrestricted charitable expenditure equating to £50,483 based on the results to 31 December 2018.

The trustees are therefore satisfied that this aim is currently being met.

Results

The Charity generated a net deficit of £9,423 during the year (2017: surplus of £90,305) and has accumulated reserves of £294,234 (2017: £303,657) at the balance date, with £82,770 of these being Unrestricted (2017: £79,555).

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The company is a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees are appointed by the existing trustees. These appointments are ratified at the first AGM following appointment.

Key management remuneration

In the opinion of the trustees there is one member of key management personnel, the Manager. The total employee benefit paid to this post in 2018 was £37,503.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are depreciated over their useful life as follows:

Plant and machinery - 4 year straight line Workspace - 40 year straight line

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
