Trustees' Report for the Year Ended 31 December 2021

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2021. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The Principal Objectives of the Trust as set out in its Memorandum of Association are:

- 1. To promote urban regeneration and the redevelopment and revitalisation of the area of Woodlands and neighbouring areas ('the operating area'), for the benefit of the residents of the operating area without distinction as to their race, age, gender, religion, or political or other opinions;
- 2. To relieve unemployment for the public benefit among people resident in the operating area in such ways as may be thought fit, including assistance to find employment;
- 3. To promote and advance health among people resident in the operating area;
- 4. To advance environmental protection and improvement for the benefit of the general public, and in particular people resident in the operating area;
- 5. To advance the arts, heritage and culture of the operating area;
- 6. To advance citizenship among people resident in the operating area;
- 7. To promote religious and racial harmony and to promote equality and diversity among people resident in the operating area;
- 8. To promote and/or support other similar projects and programmes, which further charitable purposes, for the benefit of people resident in the operating area.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Our services have evolved significantly during the pandemic, as we have adapted our work of working to reflect both our community's needs and what has been possible/practical to deliver. We have for example had an increased emphasis on supporting people with mental health difficulties, and also working with local families to tackle social isolation.

Our Community Garden remained open during the pandemic, supporting local people to grow their own food. It also acted as a base for (Covid permitting) training, workshops and community activities that focussed on arts, wellbeing and the environment. In October 2021, we were delighted to win the award of Best Community Garden in the UK in the Cultivation Street Awards.

Until May 2021, we continued to run our emergency Covid Neighbourhood Food Service in partnership with Queens Cross Housing Association, Maryhill Community Central Halls and Flourish House. Over a 13-month period (April 2020 until May 2021), the partnership delivered more than 22,000 meals and 3,800 grocery bags to over 350 different households. WCDT staff cooked over two-thirds of the meals, all of which were vegan.

Throughout the year we also ran a fortnightly "pay what you can afford" Veg Box Scheme, with 30 households each fortnight benefiting from fresh seasonal fruit and veg together along with cookery advice and seasonal recipes. In a survey of veg box recipients almost 90% of users said that the scheme had "stopped them from going hungry" and/or 'reduced the strain on their household budget", 86% said that it had 'helped them to eat more healthily" and over a third said it had made a "really significant difference to the way they eat".

From July to November 2021 our vegan Community Cafe was held outdoors on our events Terrace, serving hot soup/stew, teas and cakes to an average of 35-40 people per week.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Our outdoor terrace hosted a range of activities linked to reducing isolation and helping people cope with the stress of the pandemic. We also hosted regular Wellbeing Walks and online meet ups and workshops.

Our 'Nurture in Nature' Mental Health Project provided both one to one and group support to people impacted by the pandemic and signposted people to our wider programme of activities and people's health benefited from having clear pathways into community activities.

"I've been suffering from depression and anxiety and had a breakdown all the way through the Lockdown. Woodlands staff helped me to improve my self-esteem and feel more positive. I have now started getting out of the flat and being more active. I feel more comfortable within myself and in social situations. I have begun to volunteer at Woodlands Community events and helped out during COP26 which further boosted my confidence and self-esteem."

During the year we scaled up the support we are offering to local families. Our Little Baby Garden Group was set up by a local parent, Nuala Cook, early during the pandemic as a response to closure of mainstream baby and parent services. The group continued to meet outdoors even during the winter on our Events Terrace.

Attendance at the group has continued to grow and we are getting an increasing number of referrals from health visitors, through our anti-racism work and partnerships with refugee organisations. A survey undertaken with parents in 2021 showed that they really valued the group, praising it as "warm, welcoming and inclusive"; "friendly and affordable"; "the highlight of my week" and as "a real lifeline" for new parents.

Parents attending the group include people who are new to Glasgow, people whose family are not in Glasgow, people who moved here during the pandemic so have little social support, older parents, including those from LGBTQI background, parents from a range of ethnic minority backgrounds, first time mums and dads. Our Wee Blether outdoor playgroup also continued regularly to meet in the community garden.

An online launch for our anti-racism community library was held in March 2021 and it has operated in person from May 2021. This unique and pioneering community initiative reduces isolation and creates social connections for local people of colour and raises awareness of the causes, impacts and scale of racism within our local neighbourhoods and brings people together to empower community action and foster a sense of belonging.

The books in our library are available to borrow for free, and once people have read the book, they just return it to the special book return box in our Community Garden on West Princes Street. The library has books for people of all ages - children, young people and adults. There are fiction and non-fiction books, serious and light-hearted but all centre the lived experience of people of colour. The library has been curated by a local resident Sapna Agarwal, in conjunction with a local independent book retailer.

Our Climate Action Project continued during 2021 with activities focussed around cycling, food and reducing waste. The cycling activities were particularly popular and least disrupted by Covid restrictions.

We held an open call for partners to deliver activities with us during COP26. This resulted in a two-week outdoor programme on our Events Terrace, with 27 different events held in partnership with 15 different local, national and international organisations.

The pandemic impacted our ability to offer our normal scale volunteer programme. Despite restrictions we were able to offer outdoor volunteering opportunities for smaller numbers of people, including:

- community gardening (looking after the garden and other greenspaces)
- community cafe on the terrace (serving meals outdoors)
- cycling activity (including cycle led volunteer training)
- clean up volunteers
- events assistants (including helping at our COP26 programme)
- anti-racism community volunteers (helping with our fortnightly libraries).

Charitable Activities

Significant extra staff time was involved in making events covid secure and discussing what was or was not possible due to ever changing covid restrictions. We got more confident in this as time went on and learnt the value of keeping even simple in person activities happening.

Our Community Meeting Room for external lets remained closed during 2021 due to Covid restrictions, though was used as an overflow hot-desking space for our staff who gradually returned from home to office working as restrictions eased.

In October 2021 we moved premises. Having outgrown our portacabin we now share much improved office facilities with Visibility Scotland who are based on Queens Crescent. This new partnership will enable us to involve more people with sight loss and/or visual impairment in our community activities.

Despite the above successes the last 12 months has been extremely challenging for us. In addition to the ongoing pandemic, our community was severely affected by the rape and murder of Esther Brown.

Esther was a founding member of our community garden and for many years helped to run our community cafe and served on our board of trustees until retiring in March 2021. She was an exceptionally kind, compassionate and caring individual who dedicated her life to helping others. For over a decade she played an integral part in everything our charity did.

Esther was violently killed in her home, next door to our community garden. It was our staff and volunteers who found the crime scene on 1st June.

A man was convicted of her rape and murder in November. He had recently been released from prison after serving a 4 year sentence for the violent rape of another pensioner in her own home and was being monitored as a sex offender at the time of Esther's murder. The failing of the criminal justice system has added to our community distress.

A Women of Woodlands Support Group was established to help people cope with the trauma of Esther's death. The Group meet each Monday afternoon and offers a safe, friendly and welcoming space for local women to come together. The group helps facilitates a programme of community mental health and well-being activities for local women as well as provide training and a space for women to reflect on issues relating to campaigning, criminal justice reform and community safety. Over time the group will continue to honour Esther's way of being through acts of kindness, compassion and collaboration.

With the support of a local resident, Dr Shaina Western, a research professional from Edinburgh University, the Women's Group undertook a survey of over 200 women. The survey focused on the direct and indirect impacts of Esther's death, personal experiences of gender-based violence beyond Esther's death, and practical changes at the local, regional, and national level. A report from the survey was collated and was later finalised over the Spring of 2022.

A memorial fund for Esther was also set up to help us create a physical memorial for her at the garden which was unveiled in June 2022, as well as funds to support some of the projects she was passionate about.

Over the autumn of 2021 a survey of staff wellbeing was carried out by Kay Young, an independent wellbeing practitioner, so that we could learn how our staff team was coping. As a result, during November and December we scaled back on our public activities so as to give staff the opportunity to take some time out. We are also very grateful for the invaluable one to one support Kay provided to staff that helped us be resilient enough to continue. Our staff team deserves enormous thanks for their determination to keep going and helping each other cope with this horrific event.

A huge thanks also goes to our volunteer board of trustees for steering us through this difficult year. Particular thanks goes to Duich Mckay, who stood down after 10 years of service on the board (including 7 years as Chair). He was replaced as Chair in July by Michael Weatherhead.

We are also extremely grateful to all our funders for their support, understanding and flexibility during this uniquely challenging year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW Reserves policy

The trustees aim to maintain free reserves in unrestricted funds at a level which equates to a minimum of three months of unrestricted charitable expenditure.

Free reserves stand at £75,501 at balance date (2020: £55,305), with three months' unrestricted charitable expenditure equating to £75,060 based on the results to 31 December 2021 (2020: £69,694). The reserves policy is therefore being met and any reserves in excess of the policy will be reinvested in the ongoing development of the charity.

Results

The Charity generated a net surplus of £4,741 during the year (2020: surplus of £16,472). At the balance sheet date, the charity held accumulated reserves of £330,532 (2020: £325,791), with £75,501 of these being unrestricted general reserves (2020: £55,305) and £208,860 being tied up in fixed assets (2020: £210,629).

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Governing document

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees are appointed by the existing trustees. These appointments are ratified at the first AGM following appointment.

Key management remuneration

In the opinion of the trustees there is one member of key management personnel, the Manager. The total employee benefit paid to this post in 2021 was £43,630 (2020: £42,870).

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are depreciated over their useful life as follows: Plant and machinery - 4 year straight line Woodlands Workspace - 40 year straight line

Taxation

Woodlands Community Development Trust is a charity within the meaning of Section 467 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 of Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that such income or gains are applied for charitable purposes only.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
